Amended bylaw:


Article VII – Elections (page 34 of our Handbook)

Article IX – Amendments (page 35 of the DCGC Handbook)



SHIZEN SCHOOL OF IKEBANA

IKEBANA OF THE MONTH

The Shizen School of Ikebana offers **free** classes in the Japanese Art of Floral Arrangement the second Saturday of each month at 11am at the [St. Augustine's Oak Cliff](#) in Dallas. Shizen School incorporates uneven numbers and heights of floral materials, asymmetry, and space in their arrangements. Anyone interested in studying Ikebana is welcomed to contact ikebana.insights@gmail.com.



This rather large arrangement is a "free style". A free style arrangement is one that is not part of any official, objective teaching curriculum. It is a personal creation of an ikebanist, although almost all Shizen free styles do adhere to the traditional Shizen guidelines of (1) minimalism, (2) asymmetry, and (3) "see-throughness" (the viewer's seeing "through" the arrangement from front side to back side). This arrangement consists of only about 7 irises and many iris leaves (called "spears"). All the irises are at the top of the arrangement. Notice that the lower and upper level spears at the left are balanced at the right by 2 spears at the middle level and one spear at the upper level. The unusual pottery container is a compote (bowl on stem). The bowl part is in the shape of a small Asian boat. The entire arrangement has a wonderful "see-through" quality, which is a characteristic of Shizen arrangements.




